NAMBAN ART EXHIBIT -

The St. Louis Art Museum (St. Louis, Missouri) is presenting a special exhibition of Namban art, March 23rd through May 6th. The exhibition is the first of its kind ever to be shown in the west, and consists of approximately 70 highly important loans from various Japanese museums and private collections.

Namban art is work done by christian converts in Japan during the late 16th and early 17th centuries.

Although the exhibit consists primarily of paintings, ceramics, and lacquerwork, several outstanding tsuba are shown plus some other items of metalwork.

AKASAKA - Old pine tree design - 19th century (late generation) Rounded-square rim Height: 77mm, Width: 77mm Rim thickness: 5.2mm, Seppa-dai: 5.5mm Green paper (TKK)

This is a rather thick guard and has much appeal. The pine tree, the purplish color, thickness (thinning towards the rim) is typical of Akasaka school tsuba.



AKASAKA - Clock gear design - middle 18th century. Rounded rim Height: 78mm, Width: 75mm Rim thickness: 4.5mm, Seppa-dai: 4.8mm White paper (TKK)

A bold, crisp design, yet graceful and dignified. A most interesting design (rare). The design is bold and symetrical like Owari work, but the thinning towards the rim, the deep blackpurple color, rounded rim, say Akasaka.
