MIDWESTERN SWORD FIND -

A recent letter from Daniel Barc to the Newsletter has resulted in the meeting of our new member Mr. Akio Katsunuma and learning of his recent visit with Mr. Kiyoharu Omino, professional sword conoisseur of Tokyo. Mr. Omino apparently came to the midwest to examine and polish a particular sword presently located in the Truman Library in Independence, Missouri.

According to an article forwarded to the Newsletter by Mr. Katsunuma (Examiner, 9/5/73), the sword is one by MASAMUNE circa 1291 with gold Honami seal. The blade was presented to President Truman by Aung Sang of Burma in 1946. The article of course does not go into much detail, but the blade appears good although in poor condition, according to Mr. Omino.

Hopefully, arrangements can be made to examine this blade and to meet with Mr. Omino when he returns to the states in six or seven months to complete his work on this blade. It looks like some interesting information and oshigata will materialize out of this find, thanks to the cooperation of the above men and the Truman Library.

"KANSHO" NORI MITSU

WAKIZASHI, shinogi-zukure style

SIGNED: (omote) BISHU OSAFUNE NORIMITSU

(ura) KANSHO 3 (1462)

DESCRIPTION:

The blade is 1.65 shaku long (suriage) with a curviture of 4 bu. The yakiba is CHOJI and the hada is ITAME. The boshi is KAERI-SUKUNORBI. The blade has BO-HI with MORO-CHIRI. Yasurime are KATTE-SAGARI.

There are (5) mekugi-ana, (4) of which are plugged with silver. There is one 'nick' on the ha.

COMMENTS:

This blade is not in the National Treasure class, but most likely could be put into the Important Cultural Asset group. It has recently returned from Japan after being polished and refitted with new shirasaya and habaki. The blade is very light with a beautiful slim appearance and a most graceful blade to look at.

"KANSHO" NORIMITSU is considered to be the best among many Norimitsu. He is listed as Number NO453 in Hawley.

This group of smiths was covered in Nihonto Newsletter Volume III No. 9 - Bizen Osafune smiths.

This particular blade is owned by Mr. John Yumoto. John Clark is working with Mr. Yumoto, learning to perfect the art of oshigata making. It was through Mr. Yumoto's offer that we were able to get this most interesting oshigata for our Newsletter. Many thanks to John for this.
